NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

There have been a series of recent incidents reported to Action Fraud where a lone fraudster has approached victims whom they believe to be unfamiliar with the local area. They make an excuse to talk to the victims such as enquiring about directions or offering a recommendation for a good hotel.

After this interaction, several other fraudsters will intervene purporting to be police officers in plain clothes and will sometimes present false identification as proof. The fake officers will then give a reason to examine the victims' wallet, purse or personal items. They may also examine the first fraudster's items or try to tell victims that the first fraudster is suspicious in order to gain victim trust and appear more realistic in their guise.

After all the fake police 'checks' are finished, victims have then reported being handed back their personal items only to later realise that a quantity of money or valuables were missing.

How to protect yourself:

If an individual claims to be a police officer ask for their name and rank, force, and examine any identification presented; this is always good practice but especially important if they are not wearing a uniform.

The Police will never ask for your passwords or PIN details. Do not give this information to anyone.

The Police will never request that you withdraw/transfer any money to them or to a 'safe' account.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Following the ransomware cyber attack on Friday 12 May which affected the NHS and is believed to have affected other organisations globally, the City of London Police's National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has issued an alert urging both individuals and businesses to follow protection advice immediately and in the coming days. Ransomware is a form of malicious software (Malware) that enables cyber criminals to remotely lock down files on your computer or mobile device. Criminals will use ransomware to extort money from you (a ransom), before they restore access to your files. There are many ways that ransomware can infect your device, whether it be a link to a malicious website in an unsolicited email, or through a security vulnerability in a piece of software you use. Key Protect messages for businesses to protect themselves from ransomware:

- Install system and application updates on all devices as soon as they become available.
- Install anti-virus software on all devices and keep it updated.
- Create regular backups of your important files to a device that isn't left connected to your network as any malware infection could spread to that too.

The National Cyber Security Centre's technical guidance includes specific software patches to use that will prevent uninfected computers on your network from becoming infected with the "WannaCry" Ransomware:

Key Protect advice for individuals:

- Install system and application updates on all devices as soon as they become available.
- Install anti-virus software on all devices and keep it updated.
- Create regular backups of your important files to a device (such as an external hard drive or memory stick) that isn't left connected to your computer as any malware infection could spread to that too.
- Only install apps from official app stores, such as Google's Play Store, or Apple's App Store as they offer better levels of protection than some 3rd party stores. Jailbreaking, rooting, or disabling any of the default security features of your device will make it more susceptible to malware infections.

Phishing/smishing

Fraudsters may exploit this high profile incident and use it as part of phishing/smishing campaigns. We urge people to be cautious if they receive any unsolicited communications from the NHS. The protect advice for that is the following:

- An email address can be spoofed. Don't open attachments or click on the links within any unsolicited emails you receive, and never respond to emails that ask for your personal or financial details.
- The sender's name and number in a text message can be spoofed, so even if the message appears to be from an organisation you know of, you should still exercise caution, particularly if the texts are asking you to click on a link or call a number.

Don't disclose your personal or financial details during a cold call, and remember that the police and banks will never ring you and ask you to verify your PIN, withdraw your cash, or transfer your money to another "safe" account.

Anne and Bill Scarratt

Very sadly, Bill Scarratt died in St Luke's Hospice on the 11th May after a short illness. He survived Anne by just over two years.

Anne died very suddenly after 55 years together, and Bill never really got over her loss. We all feel that they are now together which is something very positive to have come out of his death.

Our parents moved to Kingston at the beginning of 1978, and Anne especially loved being part of village life. The community meant so much to her when they gave up sailing and she was always telling us about her latest projects (mainly art-focused!), and the many friends whom she saw regularly. Bill also enjoyed researching local history, from cataloguing graves in the churchyard to gathering memories of WW2. When Anne died in 2015, the love, care and support from everyone made all the difference and really helped us during a traumatic time.



Bill did not want a funeral, but we are going to mix our parents' ashes and scatter them together. Some will be buried in the garden at Robins Close, some are going to Shropshire in memory of the day our parents met in August 1960. The rest are going to be scattered on a beach near Roscoff almost 57 years to the day of that first meeting with Anne and Bill's children and grandchildren there to send them off. That part of northern Brittany holds very special memories for us growing up sailing along the coast, and enjoying family holidays together every year as we grew older and had children of our own. We're sure Anne will have talked about them and mentioned her sketching. We would like to thank everyone for being such wonderful friends to our parents; we could not have asked for a better place for them to live during their almost 40 years in Kingston.

KINGSTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY NEWS FOR JUNE 2017

On Thursday, April 27th a few of us went to Totnes Elizabethan House and Museum where we were met at the Reception area by the Curator who gave us a brief tour of the Merchant's house and told us the history of this interesting historic building. We were then given the opportunity to look at all the rooms with their extensive displays. The Reception area was the original Merchant's shop with a door through to the office where he would have supervised his clerks. On display in this room was an "Elizabethan treasure" a Lee Ring, which has a twin in the V&A; also on display were coins minted in Totnes over 1,000 years ago including one from the reign of King Canute. Other things of interest in the Tudor house were the Fore Hall or main living room, the Pharmacy, the Nursery and the Elizabethan kitchen and Still room. One of the most interesting rooms was on the second floor as it housed an exhibition dedicated to Charles Babbage, acknowledged by many as the father of modern computing. He attended King Edward V1 Grammar School in Totnes for a brief period. Babbage developed the cow catcher, the precursor of the flashing light-house and ophthalmoscope, amongst many other original concepts. As it was a lovely sunny day we wandered out into the fascinating herb garden before going to "The Steam Packet" for a delicious lunch.

Our next event will be in Kingston Reading Room on **Thursday, May 25th** 7.30 for 8pm when **SW Ambulance Service NHS Trust** will be giving a presentation on the evolution of the ambulance service in Devon from its early days. Then on **Thursday, June 22nd** **Graham Phillips**, Chairman of the Hope Cove Lifeboat, will be giving a talk about the history of the lifeboat since it was given as a gift by the Freemasons in the 19th Century to the present day. We are beginning to prepare our events programme for 2018 so please let us know if you know of any interesting speakers or places of historical interest; one of the places mentioned has been The Citadel in Plymouth but before we can make a booking we need to know who is interested in going. ALL CHANGE?

The five churches in the Modbury Mission Community face change with the retirement of Neil Barker. Who will be appointed? What will he/she be like? What new ideas will he/she have? What will change?

There is some truth in the suggestion that when a vicar retires, half the congregation want his successor to be a clone of his predecessor (“such a lovely man”) and half want someone completely different who will do all the things his predecessor failed to do! There have always been opposing view about change, and “new-fangled” appears in the Book of Common Prayer, as the following extract shows

“Whereas in this our time, the minds of men are so diverse, that some think it a great matter of conscience to depart from a piece of the least of their Ceremonies, they be so addicted to their old customs; and again on the other side, some be so new-fangled, that they would innovate all things, and so despise the old, that nothing can like them, but that is new: it was thought expedient, not so much as to have respect how to please and satisfy either of these parties, as how to please God, and profit them both.”

These tensions are still with us 400 years later, with some hankering after the “old” services in church and others wanting to ditch liturgy altogether. We all have our preferences, and there’s nothing wrong with that. But spiritual maturity means being willing to worship on occasion in an “alien” style which others value.

The Bible reminds us that “Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, and today and for ever”. He is the Saviour for all time, whose promises are constant and true. The Christian gospel is an unchanging one. But it is not a fossilised, dead message; we proclaim it in ways which reach people of every kind.

So let’s profit from each other’s preferences, look for ways to proclaim Jesus Christ and seek above all to please and glorify God. And during this time with no Rector, let’s use the prayer in the Parish Profile:

Almighty God, you know all our needs. Look graciously at this time on the people of this benefice. Send to us as Rector a faithful pastor, someone after your own heart, that, by your blessing, many may be brought to the joys of your eternal kingdom in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
