### Reading Room - some exciting new possibilities



Our village is extraordinarily fortunate to have the Reading Room as an asset and a public building that can be put to a wide variety of uses. It is solidly built, in

good order and well located in the immediate proximity of the pub and the church. Many other villages of our size must be envious of a facility of this size and versatility.

The Reading Room Committee is considering whether some changes could be made to the Reading Room to optimise its use and to better manage the storage of tables and chairs and other items such as stage equipment, as well as improving access arrangements between the upper floor and the lower floor.

With the very considerable help of Kevin Shotter, an architect resident in the village, we have started a project to see what changes and improvements could be made and how they might benefit not only those who use the Reading Room regularly, but also the entire village. We have established with certainty the extent of the legal title of the Reading Room and our ownership of what is sometimes called "The Pound", that is the ground between the South East elevation of the Reading Room and the wall of the pub toilets.

Sometimes these kinds of projects set off by asking the question "what can we afford?"

We are deliberately not doing that. We are asking the questions "what do we want" and "what is achievable" in practical planning and construction terms. When we have some answers, and undoubtedly there will be a range of answers, we can then start to see whether the changes we have settled upon can be funded. Depending upon available funding, we may have to rein in some of our ambitions, but that comes later.

Despite Covid -19 there are still funding opportunities out there. Within our Committee we have the skills to seek out those funds. This will not be a quick project, nor does it need to be. It is more important that we establish the best way forward for the village.

What we should like you to do is let us have your comments on these options. Many of you will remember the exercise we undertook in the Reading Room when work started on the creation of the Village Plan and you were asked then to attach Post It notes with your comments upon the displays on the boards in the Reading Room. We shall do that again for this project.

We are providing drawings in digital form through the Reading Room's Facebook page and on the Parish Council website, Reading Room pages. We shall seek your comments in this way as well.

Finally, there may be some who would like to provide lengthier responses than can be squeezed on to a Post It note.

Option A — This shows a minimal extension to accommodate a wheelchair platform lift. This leaves the floor layouts of the existing building as existing except for the connections to the lift enclosure from the landing at the top of the stairs.

**Option B** - This highlights the problem of trying to locate a lift within the envelope of the existing building. As an example, the lift is shown in the existing first floor WC so that access to it can be from the existing staircase enclosure. You will see that this location does not work with the existing ground floor layout/structure.

Option C - This is the same as Option A but with the existing disabled WC at first floor level removed to give more hall space. The existing ladies' WC is laid out as a disabled WC so, with a lift, an additional disabled WC would not be needed at ground floor level.

**Option D** - This is the same as Option A but with a larger extension at first floor level to accommodate a chair store beside the lift.

Option E - This proposal is based on the existing disabled WC being retained at first floor level with an extension to accommodate a chair store at first floor level and an extension to the existing committee room at ground floor level with no lift.

Option F - This proposal shows the extension maximised without obstructing the existing ground floor external doors and the existing highway drain. The larger extension at first floor level could accommodate a larger kitchen with a serving hatch, or a much larger chair store. Ground floor level shows an extension to the committee room similar to Option E.

### AVIAN INFLUENZA (BIRD FLU): LATEST SITUATION

New housing measures will come into force in England, Scotland and Wales on 14 December.

The Chief Veterinary Officers for England, Scotland and Wales have agreed to bring in new measures to help protect poultry and captive birds, following a number of cases of avian influenza in both wild and captive birds in the UK.

Government Chief Veterinary Officers are encouraging bird keepers to use the next 11 days to prepare for new housing measures, including taking steps to safeguard animal welfare, consult their vet and where necessary put up additional housing.

Whether you keep just a few birds as pets or thousands, from 14 December onwards you will be legally required to keep your birds indoors, or take appropriate steps to keep them separate from wild birds. We have not taken this decision lightly, but it is the best way to protect your birds from this highly infectious disease.

Poultry and captive bird keepers are advised to be vigilant for any signs of disease in their birds and any wild birds, and seek prompt advice from their vet if they have any concerns. They can help prevent avian flu by maintaining good biosecurity on their premises, including:

- housing or netting all poultry and captive birds
- cleansing and disinfecting clothing, footwear, equipment and vehicles before and after contact with poultry and captive birds – if practical, use disposable protective clothing
- reducing the movement of people, vehicles or equipment to and from areas where poultry and captive birds are kept, to minimise contamination from manure, slurry and other products, and using effective vermin control
- thoroughly cleaning and disinfecting housing at the end of a production cycle
- keeping fresh disinfectant at the right concentration at all points where people should use it, such as farm entrances and before entering poultry and captive bird housing or enclosures
- minimising direct and indirect contact between poultry and captive birds and wild birds, including making sure all feed and water is not accessible to wild birds

### Register your birds

We encourage all keepers to register their birds with us so we can contact you quickly if there is a disease outbreak in your area and you need to take action.

If you have more than 50 birds, you are legally required to register your flock within one month of their arrival at your premises. If you have less than 50 birds, including pet birds, you are still strongly encouraged to register.

### Find out how to register your birds.

Poultry and captive bird keepers and members of the public should report dead wild birds to the Defra helpline on **03459 335577 (option 7)**, and keepers should report suspicion of disease to APHA on **03000 200301**. Keepers should familiarise themselves with our <u>avian flu advice</u>.

Public Health England advise the <u>risk to public health</u> from the H5N8 and H5N2 strains of bird flu is very low. The Food Standards Agency has said that on the basis of the current scientific evidence, avian influenza poses a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

# Devon in Government Plans for increasing countryside trees and regenerating degraded hedgerows

On 5th December the government announced a cash boost of nearly £4 million to plant more trees up and down the country. This will see hundreds of thousands of new trees planted, including in towns and cities and near rivers to reduce flood risk, and help meet the government's commitment to increase planting to 30,000 hectares per year across the UK by 2025.

A pot of £2.5 million will support schemes that establish new ways of planting trees in our cities, towns and countryside. Led by Defra, Natural England and the Tree Council, this will use five pilot studies delivered on the ground by Local Authorities to develop cost-effective and innovative approaches to planting trees outside woodlands over the next two and a half years. This will include schemes such as community tree nurseries, agroforestry and hedgerow management, or planting trees from locally collected seed. These new trees will help tackle climate change and create habitats for wildlife.

10 sites across Devon and Cornwall have been chosen for these pilots to plant 17,000 new trees to reconnect habitats and improve water quality by reducing surface run off. We don't know where those sites are at present. Another project, however, coordinated by the Devon Wildlife Trust, the Saving Devon's Treescapes Project, takes in a large area of South Devon from Stokenham parish in the east, through West Alvington to Thurlestone in the west. The intention of this project is to enhance 150 km of existing degraded hedgerows and to plant 50 hectares of trees outside of woodlands in field corners and copses plus many other initiatives.

Hedgerow management if one of the key areas that has been neglected for some time and is now being seen as a priority area. Well managed hedgerows are one of the keys to increased biodiversity because hedges offer both wildlife corridors and safe places for many of our bird and small mammal species. However if you observe the hedgerows around the South Hams there are few that are healthy and of any use for wildlife. The Tree Council, Hedgelink, South Hams Society, South Hams Tree Wardens are hoping that landowners and farmers will, over the next few years, manage their hedgerows in a more ecologically sound way so that wildlife will thrive.

Christmas trees up to 6ft can be put out with brown bins, but wrapping paper cannot be placed in blue sacks.

### **Parking**

Please could residents park sensitively and ask any tradespeople you are employing to do the same – in particular, please avoid narrow sections of road that could obstruct larger farm and delivery vehicles such a tractors and milk tankers, and T-junctions.

### **Winter Driving**

The roads in our parish and to Seven Stones Cross are no longer on a primary gritting route – please therefore adjust your driving to suit the conditions and remember that others heading towards you may not be aware of the icy roads. Drive in a higher gear than normal, using low revs or winter mode if available, brake before corners, and remember that stopping distances will be much greater even with ABS and modern traction control systems. It is scary how far you can slide, even at 20mph. Please also look out for pedestrians who may be difficult to spot.

Grit bins are located around the hills in the parish but are <u>for use on the highway only</u>. Please let Cllr Freeman know if stocks are running low; we have a limited quantity available to top them up as the County Council will be slow to refill them.

### Fire Safety

The devastation caused by even a small fire is colossal – don't let your guard down over the festive season. Candles and tea lights should never be left unattended. The hob is not a good place to put anything other than pots and pans (several fires have been started by hobs accidentally switched on when boxes or clothes baskets were placed on them). Open fires and woodburners also carry a risk and although it may be tempting, don't stack wood beside them as it will dry out and may smoulder, producing carbon monoxide.

If in doubt, get out, get the fire service out, and stay out.

### Hiring Charges Kingston Reading Room



- Sessions are 8:30am to 1:30pm, 1:30pm to 6:30pm, 6:30pm to 11:30pm. If more time is needed to set up or clear away, then it should be booked.
- Hall users that satisfy the objects of the Reading Room charity Trust deed are charged at £6 per session. They must be non-profit (and may be subject to financial review) and open to all residents of Kingston Parish and be advertised in Kingston as such.
- Private events are charged at £7.50 per hour or part hour, including set up and clean up times.
  - Sole occupancy of the Reading Room for a full day is charged at £275.
- Afternoon session children's parties are charged at a concessionary rate of £10 per session.
  - The meeting room is charged at £5 per session.
    - Existing agreements will be honoured.
- Bookings are recorded in the Reading Room bookings calendar which is available on the Parish Council website. Please check the calendar before requesting a booking.

### The Vicar writes

The yearly celebration of harvest is a celebration of the kindness of God.

Psalm 145, which is often read at Harvest festivals, reminds listeners that 'The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on



all he has made... The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food at the proper time. You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing.' Yet it is not only in the sending of sun and rain that Christians see the kind hand of God, but also in the sending of the Lord Jesus Christ. One of the writers in the New Testament reflected: 'But when the kindness and love of God our Saviour appeared, he saved us, not because of righteous things we have done but because of his mercy.'

They say you are what you eat but we are also products of what we experience. One episode from history that moves me is the story of a Dutch man during the religious upheaval of the 16<sup>th</sup> century. He found himself in trouble with the authorities for his new found Christian convictions and faced execution. He managed to escape from prison and, half-starved from prison rations, fled across a frozen lake, being

pursued by the prison guard. He made it to the other side but the guard who was chasing him fell through the ice into the freezing water and started to drown. He turned around and pulled the drowning guard out of the water. The guard wanted to release him but by that time more guards had arrived and arrested him, he was put in prison again and went to his death.

His spontaneous reaction shows that ingrained into his character was kindness. Kindness had become a habit.

When I first heard that story, the question I had was how does that happen? First of all, what generates that sort of amazing kindness, to rescue a man who wanted you dead, and secondly how does it become second nature like that?

You become like what you experience. He was able to act like that because he believed he received great, great kindness from God.

This harvest as we experience the kindness of God in another yearly harvest, we can also experience the kindness of God in the sending of his Son.





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


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
