



AVIAN INFLUENZA PREVENTION ZONE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL POULTRY AND CAPTIVE BIRD KEEPERS Keep free-ranging birds in fenced areas to minimise contact with wild birds, neigbouring poultry or captive birds. Inspect outdoor areas, removing wild bird contaminants like faeces, feathers and wild bird carcases, Fence off or put netting over areas of standing water or ponds. Provide feed and water undercover, so wild birds can't access it. Make your premises unattractive to wild birds. Use bird scarers, foils or streamers. Keep ducks and geese separate from other poultry. Store bedding under cover to reduce the risk of contamination. Clean and disinfect footwear before and after tending to your birds. If you own more than 50 birds, place foot dips containing Government approved disinfectant at all entry and exit points. Clean and disinfect hard surfaces regularly. Clean and disinfect equipment and vehicles to avoid disease **/** spread between premises. Minimise the movement of people, vehicles and equipment to and from bird areas and keep records of movements. ✓ Keep records of poultry, captive bird and egg movements. **/** Maintain buildings that house birds to prevent water ingress 1 Ensure pest control is effective. Animal & 4aencv Non-compliance with these biosecurity measures may be an offence.





Police are asking everyone to be vigilant against sextortion/blackmail scams after seeing an increase in reports.

Sextortion refers to when people send each other sexually explicit photos or videos and one of the parties threatens to share the content unless the other person pays them money, they may also threaten to share images with family and friends unless a fee is paid and ask for a set amount of money.

Even if you have mutual friends do not trust these people and please protect yourselves by not sharing images. This is taking place on all social media platforms and dating websites.

Do NOT pay any money, as the offender may request further payment.

Next Kingston Parish Council Meetings - Thursday 17th **November in the Reading Room**. The next Parish Council meeting will take place in the Reading Room at 7.30pm on Thursday 17th November. Refuse and Recycling

Change of Operator to South Hams District Council. South Hams District Council (SHDC) have now begun operating the waste and recycling service themselves following the termination of FCC's contract. They have a significant number of issues to resolve, which may take some months – please bear with them. In the meantime, please continue to sort the rest of your waste and recycling as you do now, report missed collections and in particular also report any recurring problems to Cllr Suzannah Grant on sgrantkpc@gmail.com and to Bernard Taylor, our local District Councillor, on cllr.Bernard.Taylor@southhams.gov.uk, 01548 830844 or 07796 760629.

Brown Bin Collections. The free brown bin collection service will cease at the end of October, although SHDC have undertaken to empty every bin before the end of the month. Each household should have received a letter with the details. However, in summary, brown bin collections are planned to recommence in March but as an opt-in, paying service at a cost of £49 per year per bin for a maximum of 2 bins per household. You have until 22nd January 2023 to subscribe to the service, either via their website www.southhams.gov.uk/gardenwaste or by calling 01803 861234. If you choose not to subscribe to the service you can either keep your brown bin and re-use it as garden storage or you can arrange to have it removed via www.southhams.gov.uk/recyclingwaste and "contact the waste team".

<u>Christmas Tree Collection</u>. There will be no Christmas Tree collection service this year – details of options for Christmas

Tree disposal will be included in December and January newsletters.

Where Does My Waste and Recycling Go? Finally, please also see the separate article from SHDC in this month's newsletter, with details of where your recycling and waste go.

Avian Influenza (Bird Flu). On 17 October 2022 the Government declared an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone across the whole of England due to the increased number of cases of the disease across the country.

For all bird keepers (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard). You are now required by law to take a range of precautions to protect their flocks and there are minimum requirements that all bird-keepers must follow. If your birds are not housed, they must be kept in fenced / enclosed outdoor areas. Other precautions include: feeding birds under cover where there is no access for wild birds; preventing captive birds from accessing ponds and watercourses; and effectively cleansing and disinfecting any hard-standing surfaces in areas where birds are kept. Please note that Jayes fluid is a DEFRA-approved disinfectant. Full details of what is required can be found on the government website (www.gov.uk/guidance/avian-influenza-bird-flu#AIPZ),

where there is also a self-assessment checklist to help you put the measures in place, as well as more information about the virus. You can also keep up to date by regularly visiting the avian influenza section on the government website, and by registering for email or text alerts via www.gov.uk/guidance/apha-alert-subscription-service.

If you have poultry/captive birds it is your responsibility to keep updated on any outbreaks and an easy way to do this is by signing up for text notifications – register with the APHA alerts service. If you have any concerns about the health of your birds, speak to your vet promptly.

<u>For All Parishioners</u>. The risk to public health from the virus is very low, however it is important that you **do not pick up sick or dead birds**. You can report finding dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as birds of prey, to the DEFRA helpline on 03459 335577.

<u>Green Waste Disposal</u>. Following the withdrawal of the brown bin service over the winter, there are a number of options:

- 1. Take it to the recycling centre at lvybridge or Kingsbridge;
- 2. Start or increase a garden compost heap;
- 3. Purchase a compost bin these are available from most garden centres or you can get one delivered from https://getcomposting.com for a very reasonable price. It is not acceptable to dump garden waste in hedges and verges around the parish; this is fly-tipping and could lead to a fine or, worse, the death of livestock from eating your garden waste (which can be poisonous to them).

<u>Playground Maintenance</u>. KPC is seeking volunteers to assist with playground maintenance – please contact Cllr Ali Lewis (details further down) if you feel you can help.

Autumn

<u>Hedge Trimming</u>. Now we have entered autumn, KPC would like to remind all parishioners with hedges adjacent to the highways that they have a responsibility to trim them back so that they do not overhang the road. There needs to be 3m clearance to allow vehicles to pass without damage.

<u>Bonfires</u>. Bonfires are discouraged due to their environmental impact and the nuisance they can cause to neighbours.

<u>Keeping Drains Clear</u>. Whilst walking round the parish, please help to keep drains clear of leaves etc – it's simple and quick to scrape a welly boot across a grid to prevent problems when there is heavy rain.

<u>Visibility</u>. Finally, now that the clocks have gone back, it is now dark increasingly soon after 5pm. If you are around the village in the dark, please **be bright**, **be light**, **be seen at night**.

4 Rivers Dementia Visit to Tuesday Morning Market, 1st November. Liz Hitchins from 4 Rivers Dementia alliance will be visiting the Morning Market on 1st November to talk to parishioners about dementia friendly communities and her experience with dementia friendly parishes in the area. Our local SHDC councillor, Cllr Bernard Taylor, will also be with her in support. Please take this opportunity to ask any questions and gain a better understanding of how we can help those with dementia in our community.

<u>Defibrillator Training</u>. South West Ambulance Services are giving free defibrillator training, open to all. There will be a session in Kingston Reading Room, organised by KPC, on Saturday 29th October 10.00-12.00. If you would like to attend, please advise the Parish Clerk, Lorraine Squire, on kingstonclerk@gmail.com. All are welcome – no previous experience needed.

Help Reducing Energy Costs. South West Devon have a number of grants and schemes available to eligible households (normally those with a gross household income of less than £31,000) to help manage energy costs and reduce fuel bills, including:

<u>The Energy Company Obligation</u>. Facilitation of grants from big energy companies to install a variety of measures, ranging from insulation to heating upgrades;

Identification of rental properties which do not comply with Minimum Energy Efficiency Standards (MEES). Landlords please note that all rental properties should be rated E or above unless properly exempted and action will be taken against non-compliant landlords who are not willing to undertake any necessary work;

<u>Energy Efficiency Loans</u>, to support energy efficiency measures, including bulk-buy of oil, LPG and solid-fuel. To find out more, go to: https://www.southhams.gov.uk/Reduce-Fuel-Bills.

Where Does my Recycling and Waste Go?

Recycling in South Hams collected from households is bulked by material type at lvybridge Transfer Station.

Each material type is then sent for recycling at the locations below.

The mixed plastics and metals are sent for further sorting at Kenbury Wood Material Recovery Facility (MRF) just outside Exeter which is operated by Coastal Recycling.

The MRF uses a variety of mechanical and manual sorting techniques to separate the various types of plastics and metals from one another. It also removes any non-recyclables that have mistakenly been placed in the white sack.

The non-recyclable items are bulked and sent for disposal at the Energy from Waste Facility in Plymouth.

Recyclables are a commodity that can generate an income for the Council which is used to subsidise collections and other services. By separating recycling by type at the kerbside we maintain a better quality product which is easier and less costly to recycle. We work closely with our contractor, FCC Environment, to ensure that our recyclables, where possible, are kept within the UK.

Food Waste

The contents of the food caddies is tipped by the collection vehicles at lyybridge Transfer Station. Here it is bulked before being delivered to **Andigestion's Anaerobic Digestion Facility in Holsworthy**. The material is broken down in a series of sealed, oxygen free tanks to produce methane, a gas used to generate electricity and digestate, a nutrient rich fertiliser used by local farmers.

Garden Waste

Garden waste collected from households is tipped at Torr Quarry Transfer Station before being bulked and delivered to South West Compost, Brixton. Here the garden waste is composted in large heaps which are turned every few weeks to improve breakdown of the waste. The resulting compost is used on local farmland.

Residual Waste

The contents of the grey bins and seagull sacks is tipped by the collection vehicles at Torr Quarry Transfer Station where it is bulked. It is then delivered to MVV's Energy from Waste (EfW) and Combined Heat & Power (CHP) facility in Plymouth. Some waste collected from the west of the district is also delivered direct to MVV. The waste is used as a fuel to heat water into superheated steam which turns a turbine to create electricity. Leftover heat energy from this process is also used to heat the nearby dockyard and naval base.
