Because this is only an exhibition; work can be signed or unsigned, and, if the Exhibitor feels it would serve a purpose, include a title and/or a short description can be displayed.



Next Kingston Parish Council Meeting – Thursday 16th February 2023 in the Reading Room. The next Parish Council meeting will take place in the Reading Room at 7.30pm on Thursday 16th February. Kingston Parish Newsletter. KPC would like to extend its huge thanks to David Carter for editing and producing the newsletter for well over 20 years. In doing so, David has made an exceptional contribution to our village and we are sure that the whole village joins us in our gratitude. David would now like to step back and 'pass the baton' on to someone else. You will need basic IT skills and the ability to dedicate some time to the newsletter around the third weekend of every month (second weekend in December). A printer is provided by KPC and expenses (paper etc.) are also covered. Modbury Fore Street Closure. Further to the KPC notice in the December/January edition of the newsletter, advising that sections of Modbury Fore Street would be closed for approximately 3 months from 19th January to allow essential water works and repairs to take place, this work has now been postponed to 2024.

<u>Winter Preparedness</u>. Now that we are well into winter and have already experienced more than one occurrence of icy conditions, please note that Kingston is not on any gritting routes – the closest to the village is the B3392 (from the A379 at Harraton Cross to Bigbury), where the Kingston road leaves/joins at Seven Stones Cross. If needed, there are grit supplies in bins at certain strategic points in the village. However, please remember that the grit is supplied for the use on the village highways only. If it gets colder, ClIr. Merv Freeman will bring out the parish supplies of salt. If you should need to use this salt, the ratio is ONLY 1 tablespoon per square metre.

Water - Where Does It All Go? of year One of the most notable features of our parish, especially at this time, is how much water there is - on the roads, in the fields, in our gardens Some of this is rainfall, which leads to surface water, but this is added to by a lot of spring water (no surprise as our village founders would have built where fresh water was available). All this water wends its way across the parish to the sea, some in open streams, some in culverts and drains. It tends to combine in valley down at Walkspool before moving on to the sea at Westcombe. Unfortunately, this means that anything in the water tends to get washed along until it meets an obstruction. Then, it attaches and as things build up eventually there is a blockage; when enough water builds up behind the blockage it gets dislodged and moves on to the next straining point (or the sea) – a natural cycle of cleansing. This means that any plastic, cigarette ends, bits of twig, leaves, oil and road debris entering the water and joining its journey slows the flow and contributes to blockages. This can cause the water to back up towards the source and flooding occurs. Water is a powerful and devastating element, causing damage whenever it gets out of control. Your help in keeping the smooth flow of water is required.

The village sewerage network is fragile: it was designed and built in simpler times when washing was only done once a week, and bath night was a weekly fixture. It now struggles with modern lifestyles and several dozen houses have been added to the system since; it is now at full capacity and can burst from the constraints of the pipes and problems down at Walkspool. cause Although responsibility lies with South West Water, we can help by simple adjustments to our behaviour. Please: never pour fat or oil down the drain - cool it in a pot, soak it up with kitchen towel and then place it in the bin; and take care when using disposable wipes - even if they claim to be "flushable" please put them in the bin as our elderly system cannot cope with them, whatever the manufacturers claim.

Potholes. Devon County Council (DCC) are currently dealing with a very high number of pothole reports due to the cold and wet weather. However, approximately one third of reports received are duplicates. On their <u>Report a</u> <u>Problem</u> page you can: report potholes for assessment; provide an email address to receive automatic updates; see where potholes have already been reported; and see where DCC have already asked their contractor to carry out repairs. Where a report already exists you do not need to create a new report to receive updates – just select the relevant report and click on 'add me to this pothole'. Your help in reducing the number of duplicate reports DCC receive will enable their inspection team to work as efficiently as possible during these challenging conditions.

Saving Money on Childcare Bills. If you are a working parent or carer, there is government help with paying for childcare: you can get up to £500 every 3 months to help with the costs of childcare – if your child has a disability you can get up ton £1,000 every 3 months. Your child must be 11 or under and usually live with you; they cease to be eligible on the 1 September after their 11th birthday. Hall Hire charges 2023

- Sessions are 8:30am to 1:30pm, 1:30pm to 6:30pm, 6:30pm to 11:30pm. If more time is needed to set up or clear away, then it must be booked.
- Commercial events are charged at £7.50 per hour or part hour, including set up and clean up times.
- The charge for sole occupancy of the Reading Room for a full day is by negotiation.
- Hall uses that satisfy the objects of the Reading Room charity trust deed are charged at a subsidised £10 per session. They must be non-profit (and may be subject to financial review) and open to all residents of Kingston Parish, be advertised in the Kingston Newsletter and on Kingston related social media (e.g. KEG Facebook page) as such and be approved by the Management Committee at least one month in advance of the first session.
- Private parties for Kingston Parish residents are charged at a concessionary rate of £10 per session.
- The downstairs meeting room is charged at £5 per session.
- Bookings are recorded in the Reading Room bookings calendar which is available on the Parish Council website.
