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FUTURE OF THE READING ROOMS - OPEN FORUM FEEDBACK

The project to enlarge the Reading Room and maximise its benefits and uses for our community continues.

After establishing the available space for building works, reaching agreement with South West Water, obtaining planning permission and getting the proposed work professionally costed, we are now at the point where we need to see if the project can be funded.

We intend to put forward proposals to obtain funding from the National Lottery and other funders and we shall only succeed if we can demonstrate good support for the project and the delivery of practical benefits for our community. We believe we can achieve this, but we need to satisfy our funders and so we need your help.

A big thank you to those of you who attended the Open Forum at the Reading Room on 6th September. There was a lively debate as a result of some really interesting questions put to the Committee and our experts who kindly attended to explain the plans. It was really good to hear the views of the residents of the village.

There was an explanation of the proposed project. Our thanks must be extended to Kevin Shotter and Jerry Barnes who helped out with the more technical questions regarding the project and the chair of the meeting, Andy, who gave everybody who wanted to an opportunity to air their views.

We believe that by the end of the meeting any misconceptions about the funding and the proposed renovation plans were fully addressed and explained.

The show of hands at the end of the meeting did indicate that there was a clear majority of those present in favour of the project proceeding to the next stage.

So, what's next?

- We need to get the project funded and we can only achieve this if we can demonstrate that Kingston supports the plan.
- We are proceeding with "The Reading Room and its place in the community" survey. You will receive the survey in three ways:
 - Click on this link https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/NV5KL7B and complete the survey online (this link is also available on the Reading Room web page).
 - o If you provided your email, you will also receive an email invitation to complete the survey.
 - A paper version will be distributed to all homes in the parish. If you complete the survey this way you can post a version back:
 - At the Reading Room (including the Tuesday morning market).
 - Through the letter box at Pounds Farm.
 - Or email KRRSecretary22@gmail.com and it can be collected from your home.
- Once we have your responses, we will analyse them and decide how we proceed from there. And of course, we will keep you informed.
- If you provide any personal data (which is completely voluntary) we will only use this for the purposes of this survey.

Thank you in advance for completing the survey and remember, we can't proceed without the support of the village. So, if you have an opinion make sure it's heard!

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD BOXES

The Kingston Local History Society's Annual General Meeting is fixed for 7pm for 7.30pm on Thursday 26th October 2023 in the Reading Room.


As usual, drinks and nibbles will be available prior to the start of the AGM and we look forward to seeing as many members as possible.

There will be a session in Kingston Reading Room, organised by KPC, on **Saturday, 28th October 2023 at 10.30am – 12 noon**. Forthcoming Changes to the Refuse & Recycling Service:

SHDC will be writing to all residents in the near future to advise of upcoming changes to the refuse and recycling service – their aim is for the whole district to receive the same kerbside service. The day(s) of our weekly collections may change as a result – KPC will keep you informed.

Container Deliveries: For those parishioners who have still been using the clear and blue recycling sacks, SHDC are finally in a position to complete the rollout of the new recycling containers. Your new containers will be delivered will take place over the next 4-5 weeks and should comprise: 2x recycling boxes with lids; a white recycling sack; a kerbside food waste caddy; a smaller food waste caddy for your kitchen; and an information pack explaining how to use it all. **However, please do not start using them until you hear from SHDC, by post, when to start using them** – keep them somewhere safe until then. <u>Broken Glass</u>. KPC are aware of the recent problem (20th September) with a refuse/recylcing vehicle dropping broken glass onto the lanes between the Church, Wonwell Gate Cross and Scobbiscombe. South Hams District Council have investigated – it appears that the back of a recycling vehicle had not been properly secured – and taken steps to ensure it will not happen again. <u>SHDC Consultation – Let's Talk About South Hams:</u> SHDC have developed a number of aims and ambitions for the South Hams, based on challenges residents have told them about. The consulation on their draft Corporate Strategy in response has now begun. You can have your say a number of ways: through their online survey, which is open until 23rd October - https://ourcorporatestrategy.commonplace.is, by taking part in the polls on their social media channels, and/or by going to one of their public consultation sessions this October (dates when known will be published via KEG).

<u>Dog Mess:</u> Regrettably, the amount of dog mess in the village is increasing again. Please pick up after your dog and dispose of the bagged poo in an **<u>appropriate</u>** place – i.e. a suitable bin, not the nearest hedge. Please also challenge others – including visitors – to do the same.

Recreation Ground Skate Park: Unfortunately the skate park equipment in the recreation ground has reached the end of its life – it is not safe so *please* do not use. Sources of funding to replace it are being investigated. In the meantime, it needs to be removed – if you can help with dismantling it and/or taking the metal for scrap, or know someone who can, please contact either the Parish Clerk or Cllr Joel Wakeling (07546 511578).

<u>Parking:</u> Please be aware and vigilant regarding how and where we park – we need to leave sufficient access for emergency vehicles, large farm vehicles, soon some enormous combine harvesters and of course the refuse and recycling trucks.

Kingston Reading Room Hall Hire charges 2023



- Sessions are 8:30am to 1:30pm, 1:30pm to 6:30pm, 6:30pm to 11:30pm. If more time is needed to set up or clear away, then it must be booked.
- Commercial events are charged at £7.50 per hour or part hour, including set up and clean up times.
- The charge for sole occupancy of the Reading Room for a full day is by negotiation.
- Hall uses that satisfy the objects of the Reading Room charity trust deed are charged at a subsidised £10 per session. They must be non-profit (and may be subject to financial review) and open to all residents of Kingston Parish, be advertised in the Kingston Newsletter and on Kingston related social media (e.g. KEG Facebook page) as such and be approved by the Management Committee at least one month in advance of the first session.
- Private parties for Kingston Parish residents are charged at a concessionary rate of £10 per session.
- The downstairs meeting room is charged at £5 per session.
- Bookings are recorded in the Reading Room bookings calendar which is available on the Parish Council website. Please check the calendar before requesting a booking.

PUBLIC OPINION

"Britain isn't a Christian nation now, say clergy". That was the headline from a recent survey by The Times which drew attention to the continuing fall in church attendance and to changing attitudes towards sex. It concluded that amongst "front-line Anglican clergy there was "a desire for significant changes in teaching on sex, sexuality, marriage and the role of women, to bring the church more into line with public opinion".

The reporters – and they are not alone – thus see the role of the Church to be an expression of public opinion, with no necessary link to truth. But public opinion will change, sometimes quite dramatically. The Palm Sunday cry of "hosanna" had become "crucify him" by the following Thursday.

Rather, the Church is called to be God's mouthpiece, with The Bible as God's Word. This, not popular opinion, is the Christian's guide. Sadly, Christians have too often failed to proclaim the teaching of Scripture and its wonderful offer of forgiveness and new life in Christ Jesus. God calls his Church to share that message of good news for all people, and to do so with conviction, but in love and sensitivity.


