So we blinked, Christmas came and went and the New Year is well underway...


Traditionally a quiet time in the village, but we still have a few things going on to keep you busy – see inside for details...



# **FEBRUARY 2024 CHURCH NEWS**

<u>Next Kingston Parish Council Meeting:</u> Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> February 2024 in the Reading Room. The next Parish Council meeting will take place in the Reading Room at 7.30pm on Thursday 15th February. The Agenda will be placed on the Parish Website no later than 8th February. Public are welcome to join the Open Forum which is held at the beginning of each KPC meeting for any questions you may have.

<u>Water:</u> One of the most notable features of our Parish, which has been particularly evident over the last few months with 10 named storms hitting the UK, is how much water there is – on the roads, in the fields, in our gardens...

**Flooding** - Thank you from KPC to the various residents across the Parish who have cleared blocked drains swiftly when floods have occurred over the last several weeks. If you are driving through a flooded patch of road and there are pedestrians around — who may be busy clearing the drains to allow the floodwater to flow away — please drive slowly, carefully and above all considerately past them to avoid soaking them unnecessarily.

Please help keep water flowing smoothly in our parish - This is a combination of rainfall and spring water and it wends its way across the parish to the sea via open streams, culverts and drains. Crucially, it also tends to combine in the valley at Walkspool before moving on to the sea at Westcombe. Unfortunately, this means that anything in the water tends to get washed along until it meets an obstruction. It then attaches and, as things build up, eventually there is a blockage. When enough water builds up behind the blockage, it gets dislodged and moves on to the next straining point (or the sea) – a natural cycle of cleansing. This means that any plastic, cigarette ends, bits of twig, leaves, oil and road debris entering the water and joining its journey slows the flow and contributes to blockages. This can cause the water to back up towards the source and flooding occurs. Furthermore, the village sewerage network is fragile: it was designed and built in simpler times when washing was only done once a week and bath night was a weekly fixture. It now struggles with modern lifestyles and several dozen houses have been added to the system since. It is at full capacity and can burst from the constraints of the pipes and cause problems down at Walkspool. Although responsibility lies with South West Water, we can still help by simple adjustments to our behaviour. *Please: never pour fat or oil down the drain –* cool it in a pot, soak it up with kitchen towel and then place it in the bin; and take care when using disposable wipes - even if they claim to be "flushable" - please put them in the bin as our elderly system cannot cope with them, whatever the manufacturers claim.

<u>Saving on Energy Bills:</u> If you own your home, have a household income of less than £31K per annum and have heating that is not mains gas with an EPC rating of D, E, F or G, you could be eligible for some home improvements such as better insulation or a carbon heating system. SHDC are working with South Dartmoor Community Energy to help lower income households in the most need of upgrading. To check whether you are eligible and apply online:

Church Street: road closed for 5 weeks from 8<sup>th</sup> January;

Moon Lane/Church Lane: road closed for 5 days from 12<sup>th</sup> February: Poundwell Street: road closed overnight for 1 week from 29<sup>th</sup> January.

# YEALM & ERME SPECIES SURVIVAL PROJECT (YESS) Helping non-farming landowners enhance wildlife and climate resilience

We are delighted to report that the Environment Agency has awarded funds to help non farming landowners (NFLs) in the Yealm and Erme catchments to better manage their land to support wildlife and climate change resilience. Thanks to this funding, YESS, (a collaboration between **WATER** and the **Yealm Estuary to Moor (YEM)**), is working with ParkLife South West and Devon Wildlife Trust (DWT), to deliver a Pilot Project by the end of March.

The YESS project will provide expert advice and practical support leading to capital works and the Pilot Project will get us started. We hope that YESS will become an established project, with NFLs being encouraged through talks and events to become a network/community who can share experiences and provide mutual support to assist the longer-term success of the project.

The work will seek to mirror the successful project delivered by Devon Wildlife Trust in the neighbouring Avon catchment ('The Avon Project') though providing advice and delivering practical interventions to deliver multiple benefits.

Following a call to NFLs in the Erme and Yealm catchments, which resulted in over 70 responses, a short list of potential sites has been identified. A series of site visits and assessments is underway. We have received lots of exciting ideas from NFLs including tree planting, creation of hedges, ponds and meadows, flood and erosion prevention and fencing to protect trees and rivers from livestock. YESS plans to deliver at least 3 projects on the ground by the end of March.

WATER would like to thank YEM who have taken the lead in getting this project up and running.

# **Kingston Reading Room Hall Hire charges 2024**



- Sessions are 8:30am to 1:30pm, 1:30pm to 6:30pm, 6:30pm to 11:30pm. If more time is needed to set up or clear away, then it must be booked.
- Commercial events are charged at £8 (from 1 February 2024) per hour or part hour, including set up and clean up times.
- The charge for sole occupancy of the Reading Room for a full day is by negotiation.
- Hall uses that satisfy the objects of the Reading Room charity trust deed are charged at a subsidised £10 per session. They must be non-profit (and may be subject to financial review) and open to all residents of Kingston Parish, be advertised in the Kingston Newsletter and on Kingston related social media (e.g. KEG Facebook page) as such and be approved by the Management Committee at least one month in advance of the first session.
- Private parties for Kingston Parish residents are charged at a concessionary rate of £10 per session.
- The downstairs meeting room is charged at £5 per session.
- Bookings are recorded in the Reading Room bookings calendar which is available on the Parish Council website. Please check the calendar before requesting a booking.
